2016, A NEW YEAR in the LIFE of the ROYAL ARCH IN SOMERSET

A Day in the Country for over 200 Companions Including: 13 Grand Superintendents, 3 Past Grand Superintendents, 10 Deputy Grand Superintendents, First Principal of all 28 Somerset Chapters.

A Galaxy of Companions filled the main hall at the Webbington Hotel, Loxton for the Annual Convocation of Somerset Royal Arch Masons. The afternoon commenced with the ceremonial processions of distinguished guests and visiting Grand Superintendents associated with such an event in an array of crimson and blue. The First Principals entered under the banner of Dungarven Chapter No. 973. The accompanying organ music of Comp Barry Renwick adding atmosphere and grandeur.


Its logo has always been the Maltese Cross.

"What are they looking so pleased about? We know what's ahead of them !"






A Lighter Shade of Gray


